


National Online Chess Playing Sites Chess.com Lichess.com Shaking off the Rust and Returning to Chess After 21 years by Gambit Editor, Bruce Draney

In the spring of 2002, my son Heath graduated from high school and went on to attend college at Chadron State out in northwestern Nebraska. Since he and I had been constant chess travel companions for 10 years, going to Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, Iowa, South Dakota, all over Nebraska, and even to the U.S. Open in St. Paul in 2000, his departure to the far reaches of the state marked an end (at least temporarily) to my rated tournament chess play.

My last actual rated event was February 2002 in Columbus. I did play in an unrated event at Chadron State in Heath's Senior year (tying for first place with him) but I let my membership at USCF lapse and walked away.

I should mention that I've done this before. In 1982, I stopped playing tournament chess for a period of 9 years after going 2-3 in the Open section of the Nebraska State Scholastic in February of that year. Things were going well as I won my first game and then upset many-time State Champion Richard Perry in round 2 before losing my last 3 games. I walked away the first time after that.

Although I didn't play rated chess after the 2002 Columbus event, I did still keep track of friends and acquaintances that I'd made in the 1990's, including people like Tony Dutiel who was a 7th Grade student in my chess club at Papillion Junior High years ago, Kent Nelson, who I've been friends with since the mid 1970's and Wayne Pressnall of North Platte who passed away in July of 2023.

I started chess clubs every year at Benson High, where I was a teacher, and several of my students played in Drew Thyden's Central High's scholastic events held every November. I made visits to chess clubs and tournaments to check in on the goings on. I remember going to UNO, Camelot Chess Club and the Omaha Chess Inc. club at Lewis and Clark Middle School. I still remember deciding to stop by Brownell-Talbot to check in on the Closed one year. I just happened to get there as it had ended and none other than John Watson was coming out of B-T and he knew me even though we had never met in person. John had moved back to Nebraska for a time, but alas is now back in San Diego.

Former NSCA President Michael Gooch even talked me into playing a simul against some kids attending a chess event at what was then called the Qwest Center and trying to coax me back into chess with sample BBQ at River City Roundup one year. I was sorely tempted as good BBQ is definitely an Achilles heel.

I will confess that I walked away for a number of reasons, but now I'm back with regenerated enthusiasm to leave a mark on the Omaha and Nebraska chess world. I'm happy to say that chess in Nebraska is thriving as the page long list above of active chess clubs all over the state is proof. Tournaments are being organized and run every month and I've never seen such enthusiasm for both scholastic and open chess events. If anything, the true difficulty is finding an available weekend to hold a tournament without encroaching on another organizer's event.

I only knew three of the principal organizers and directors of chess events when I returned to the state this past spring: Tony Dutiel who is now a certified Senior TD, Michael Gooch who still heads Omaha Chess, and Kent Nelson.

Unfortunately, in my 21-year absence a number of friends and chess players have died including greats like Mike Chess, Mark Scheidies, Gary Marks, Craig Collister, Tom Cook and one of my closest friends, Wayne Pressnall of North Platte. My tribute to Wayne will be published in the July-September edition of this Gambit.

Since my return, my primary focus has been on the rich history of chess in our state and I was delighted to find that I still had my Omaha Chess Archive bound editions that I wrote from 1992 until 2000. They contain games, stories, cross tables and articles from 30 years ago. In late July I created a Facebook discussion group that focuses on Nebraska Chess History and many friends including Loren Schmidt, Kent Nelson, Richard Perry, John Drexel, Dennis Wasson, Craig Wilkins, Bob Holliman and numerous others who share the interest in Nebraska chess history have joined the group and contributed to the discussions. As I write this, I have returned to directing and organizing, having organized the Hall of Fame Memorial Tournament in December of 2023, and just having directed the Open section of the Winter Open in February of 2024.

NEBRASKA STATE CLOSED CHAMPIONSHIP 2022 CALENDAR YEAR

The State Closed Championship for the 2022 calendar year was held in Lincoln, Nebraska on January 8-9, 2023. Six players competed for the title of Nebraska State Champion, including Matt Naumann, Scott Look, Tony Dutiel, Nick Lacroix, Steven Cusumano and 2020 defending Nebraska Co-Champion, John Linscott. Due to the pandemic, there was no Championship held in 2021, but Linscott and Nelson had tied for the championship at the very beginning of 2020 before the pandemic canceled the rest of the chess schedule for the year.

When the two-day event ended, Nick Lacroix emerged as the new Nebraska State Champion with 4.5-.5. Tony Dutiel finished a strong 2nd with 3-2, Cusumano had 2.5, Linscott 2.0, and Look and Naumann both had 1.5.

The NSCA made some changes to the qualifying system as this was possibly the weakest State Closed Championship field in many years, featuring only one player rated over 1900 and one Class B and one Class C player. New POY rules were developed to emphasize quality results over simply participating in multiple events and accumulating POY credits. The 2023 qualifiers would come from the Cornhusker State Games Open winner, the Midwest Open Winner, the Great Plains Open Winner, the defending champion and the top two POY winners.

UNO JANUARY SWISS

The first Open tournament of 2023 was held on January 14, 2023 at UNO. The event was organized by NSCA President Steven Cusumano and was directed by Dan Willis. There were 4 sections and the event attracted a total of 43 players, including 10 in the Open, 10 in the Under 1600 section, 13 in the Under 800 section and 10 in the Under 400 section. Chad Forsman, John Davidson, Ryan Peng Dong and Thomas Smith Lilly, Jr. tied for 1st in the Open section with 3-1, Leo lacono of Lincoln took 1st in the Under 1600 section with a perfect 4-0 score, Harshith Yelle and Siddharth Parthasarathy tied for first in the Under 800 section with 3.5-.5, and Taylor Shedivy won the Under 400 section with 3.5-.5.

The UNO events drew very well and were well run throughout the 2023 calendar year. For most of the year they were held on the 3rd floor of the Milo Bail Student Center on UNO's campus but in November they moved to the CPACS building near the belltower. Thanks to Michael Gooch, Steven Cusumano, Michael Mills and others who organize or direct these fun and well attended chess events at a reasonable cost. Below are cross tables of the event.

FEBRUARY OF 2023

On February 18th, 2023, the NSCA sponsored a Rapid and Blitz Event here in Omaha. The event was directed by NSCA Omaha VP, Michael Mills and it attracted 20 players to both the Rapid G/10+2 event, and Blitz 3/+2 event. Winner of the G/10+2 event was Luke Miller (2183) of Iowa with a perfect 6-0 score. Top Nebraskan was Ryan Peng Dong (1665) who scored 5-1. Matt Buckley (1671) and Jeffrey Solheim (1466) both finished 3rd with 4-2. Four players had 3.5-2.5 including Nick Lacroix (1936), Chad Forsman (1726), Rama Raju Kalidindi (UNR) and Trevor Smailys (1103).

In the Blitz 3/+2 event, it was a double Swiss System of 6 rounds (12 games) and Miller (2174) won with 10.5-1.5 losing only one game against Chad Forsman and drawing Ryan Peng Dong (1508). Ryan took clear 2nd place with 9-3. Nick Lacroix (1931) took clear 3rd with 8.5-3.5. There was a 4 way tie for 4th place between Kalidindi (UNR), Lilly (1467), Castaneda (1339) and Hatfield (UNR) all with 7-5.

Three other sections were held concurrently including an Under 1200, an Under 800 and an Under 400 section. All in all the event drew a nice crowd of 59 players in the 5 sections.

CHESS IN NEBRASKA 50 YEARS AGO THE 1973 NEBRASKA STATE SCHOLASTIC CHAMPIONSHIP.

Back in September of 1963, a group of Lincoln chess enthusiasts that included businessmen B. Frank Watson, a Lincoln attorney, Aleks Liepnieks, Lincoln's strongest player and organizer, and UNL English professor, Robert "Bud" Narveson decided to create the Lincoln Chess Foundation which was Nebraska's first 501c3 non-profit whose mission was to promote chess.

Two years after the LCF was founded, Bud Narveson decided to organize an annual state high school chess tournament called the Nebraska State Scholastic. Since Bud was a UNL professor, the first events were held every year on campus at the UNL Student Union in the big ballroom upstairs.

Bud invited high schools from all over Nebraska to send teams of 4 players to participate. In order to accommodate schools that had more than 4 interested players Bud created a Championship section for the top 4 players and a Challenger Division for any other interested players that still wanted to participate but couldn't make the "A" team. The Championship section was USCF rated, and the top team and top individual would become Nebraska State High School Champions, but the winners of the Challenger Section earned complimentary USCF memberships as a prize.

It was also in the 1960's that the first issue of the Gambit was produced. It was hand typed and mailed with the Lincoln Chess Foundation's non-profit bulk mailing label to interested subscribers. Note that the NSCA didn't even exist yet and really the only real coordination of chess events and activities came from communication between Lincoln and Omaha chess organizers.

Fast forward now to the year 1973. Fifty years ago, I was a Senior in high school at Lincoln East High. I was President of the Lincoln East Chess Club and in February I led our team in the State Scholastic this time in the Championship Division. I unfortunately do not have a cross table of the event but can tell you that Omaha Central blew everyone away in 1973, with a team composed of Mike Blankenau, John Milton, Mark Seitzer and Kevin Waterman.

All 4 of them were rated over 1600 while still in high school. I do remember losing to Seitzer in either the 4th or 5th round but this Central team, might have been the greatest high school team in Nebraska history. Both Blankenau and Milton became Masters and also won one or more State Championships. Central's team went to the National High School in 1973 and although they didn't win, I'm pretty sure they did well.

The Lincoln Chess Foundation gave the top high school champion each year, a small stipend to help them attend the National High School tournament held each summer at the Hotel McAlpin in New York City. Eventually, the National High School was replaced by the Denker Tournament of Champions where each state could send one high school champion to compete.

Central repeated in 1974 as Blankenau was only a Junior in 1973. Over the last 50 years the nature and structure of the Nebraska State Scholastic has changed and obviously the huge expansion of scholastic chess all the way down to the Kindergarten-level has transformed the event. Although the Denker still exists for the top high school champion from each state, USCF has added national scholastic invitationals for middle school, and elementary school as well as for top woman and senior in each state.

The year, 1973, was probably the high-water mark for chess in Nebraska, not only in scholastic chess but for Open events as well as in October of 1973, over 100 players played in the Midwest Open in a single section won by Dan Reynolds of Omaha. Bobby Fischer hysteria had brought a huge number of interested players into USCF and many of them like me started their rated chess playing careers with the February Scholastic of 1973.

(Editor's Note: The following corrections were made to the original article. The original founders of the LCF were actually B. Frank Watson, Aleks Liepnieks and Bud Narveson and did not include Bennett Martin. It was Martin and not Watson that owned the Lincoln Hotel on 9th and P.)

HUMOROUS CHESS STORIES: THE LORD OF THE BOARD OF THE FLIES-THE 1988 MIDWEST OPEN.

Beginning with this issue, I plan to feature a funny but true chess story involving myself or other Nebraska chess players who shared the stories with me. My first story comes to me via two good friends, Kent Nelson and the late Wayne Pressnall of North Platte who passed away in July. Wayne first told me the story, but later on Kent shared the same story in his biography of the late Anton Sildmets.

In 1988, the Midwest Open was held in the fall in Lincoln at the Best Western Airport Inn. The event attracted over 40 players and was won by Kevin Fleming who went on to win the Closed for that calendar year, but the funny story really had nothing to do with the chess tournament but rather with a pesky invasion of the tournament hall by what Kent described as "killer flies".

The weather on this fall weekend was so pleasant that someone decided to open the doors to the playing room to let in fresh air. Unfortunately, not just the fresh air came in while the doors were open but hundreds of flies which became such a distraction and annoyance by the 4th round on Sunday that the director (most likely Gary Marks) asked everyone to stop their clocks grab a newspaper or fly swatter and go ballistic on the pests.

Wayne Pressnall in particular was one of the best relators of funny stories and he had such a unique way of telling them that they just made you laugh all the harder. According to Wayne, everyone agreed that longtime friend and Gambit Editor, Kent Nelson won the record for most flies killed on that fateful day. To this day Kent's modesty prevents him from bragging up the accomplishment but he doesn't dispute the claim either.

2023 OMAHA CITY CHAMPIONSHIP

The 2023 Omaha City Championship was held on March 18, 2023 in Omaha and was directed by Tony Dutiel who is now Nebraska's most active Senior TD. The event featured the Open, an Under 1600, Under 800 and Under 400 in addition to a Rapid Championship. Steven Cusumano is Omaha City Champion for 2023 with a score of 4-0.

The Omaha City Championship is an Open tournament and is a POY event, meaning positive scores from the Open section count in the Player of the Year Standings. Basically a person's overall score in a POY event is calculated by subtracting losses in an event from wins and dropping draws. So if a person scores 3-2 in a POY event they get 1 point in the standings. If they score 3.5-1.5 they get 2 points in the standings. The system was changed to reward quality performances rather than volume.

Persons not residing in Omaha are not eligible for the title of Omaha City Champion, but obviously may still play in the event. The event drew 60 players in 5 sections. Congratulations to the winners. The 2024 event is already on the schedule for March 30th, 2024.
