

It was first published in 'Detroit Free Press' newspaper in 1887.

W: Kc3 Qb7 Bb8 Nd5 (4) B:Kc5 Re6 Pe3 Pf6 (4)

The nice key 1.Nc7! gives the black King a flight on d6 and threatens 2.Nxe6#.

The three defenses block the squares around the black King.Thus,1...Rd6 2.Qb5#,1...Rc6 2.Qb4#,1...Rb6 2.Qd5#.

Note the two tries 1.Ne7? (threat 2.Qb4#) and 1.Nb4? (threat 2.Nd3#) refuted respectively by 1...Rxe7! and 1...Rd6!

It was the final state qualifying tournament of 2023, and the top Nebraska resident gained a slot in the 2024 Closed Championship. Former Nebraskan Ben Fabrikant and Joe Knapp of Omaha tied for 1st with 4.5-.5. Knapp won the slot in the Closed since Fabrikant now lives in Uruguay. The event was directed by Tony Dutiel. A rated beginners open was held on Saturday only and was directed by Michael Gooch.

Although I directed the event, I ended up playing the last 2 rounds to avoid byes.

HUMOROUS CHESS STORIES PART III: The Man Who Lost by Forfeit to Bye.

This story originally appeared in my Omaha Chess Archive back in the 1990's but was told to me by longtime friend and Nebraska Hall of Fame great, Loren Schmidt. Despite the bizarre title, the story is true and led to many wisecracks and jokes over the years.

Back in the 1970's, there was an active chess player from Indiana named Charles Bye. He's still listed in the USCF database with a rating of 1500, but I'm sure that he hasn't played in decades. Mr. Bye used to show up for tournaments which sometimes led to very confusing situations.


Loren recounts that one day he showed up for a tournament in Iowa and in one of the early rounds, his opponent saw on the pairing sheet his own name and "Bye" and just assumed he had a full point bye that round. So, he left the tournament figuring he had hours to burn before the next round. Richard Bye, however, showed up, started his opponent's clock and after an hour when the person still had not shown up for the game, he got up, circled his name and put "WF" next to the result so the director would know it was not a played game and was a forfeit win.

So, when the next round was about to start, the opponent who had left thinking he had a bye noticed that he had been given a forfeit loss instead. He only then discovered that his opponent in that previous round was actually named, Bye.

Whenever Mr. Bye was playing in a tournament, directors needed to inform the players that, there was an actual player named Bye and that they needed to make sure their opponent was not an uppercase Bye as opposed to a lowercase bye.

Loren later quipped to me that it was even funnier when Bye got a bye himself and the pairing sheet literally read, "Bye-bye". Had Mr. Bye been a strong player, it probably would have been less of an issue, but because he was pretty much a lifetime C-D player it added to the confusion.

The Truly "Open" Tournament by Heath Draney



The Edmar Mednis Memorial Invitational was a 10 player round robin invitational held over 5 days here in Omaha from November 15th-19th. To the best of my knowledge, it was the first FIDE norm event ever held in the state of Nebraska. It was organized by Elite Chess of Chicago and directed by FIDE Arbiter Bill Buklis. The event was a success and drew a strong field that included one GM, John Fedorowicz, and two IMs. Six of the participants were rated over 2300 and Fedorowicz was over 2400. The remaining three were all over 2200.

Chess Life Editor John Hartmann did an outstanding writeup of the event and published several of the event's best games. Although no one earned a norm in the event, Adam Dorrance of Canada and Augusto Cesar Campos tied for first place with 5.5-3.5. Dorance lost only 2 games, one to Torres and another to Canty. Campos had no losses but ended up drawing 7 of his 9 games. Fedorowicz finished third with 5-4, but was bothered by a head cold through much of the event.

There is a reasonable chance that more such events will be held here in the future for several reasons. One is the affordable cost of playing sites especially compared to places like New York, Chicago or Los Angeles and another is the centralized location and easy accessibility to Omaha by air and a high-quality airport only 5 minutes from downtown.

Chess in Nebraska 30 Years Ago, the 1993 Midwest Open.

For over 50 years, the most prestigious open chess tournament in Nebraska was the Midwest Open, which began in 1948 and was then called the Nebraska Open. It was really started by the major chess organizers of that time from North Platte, Hastings, Lincoln and Omaha. Previous State Championships while they had been held were only drawing fewer than 15 players to compete and they were often either round robins or double round robins. So, the Nebraska Chess Association, the predecessor of the NSCA, decided to hold an open Swiss system event to appeal to a wider number of players from all over the state and to increase competition. The event was originally held on Labor Day weekend and was 6 rounds. The first one was held in North Platte in 1948. The second was held in Hastings and the third was held in Omaha.

After the third event, they decided to change the name to the Midwest Open, but it was really the same event, with a new name. Then, in 1951, the first actual Midwest Open by that name was held also in North Platte. As the years went by the event was reduced to five rounds and sometimes it was held in early September, while in others, it was held in October and even in a couple of years in November. Until 1981, the top Nebraskan in the event earned the title of Nebraska State Champion. To avoid controversies of high rated players impacting our state championship, the NSCA established the Closed and so the final Midwest Open to decide our state champion was 1981 and Richard Perry claimed that honor. Just to be fair the NSCA recognized two champions in 1981. Perry was the Midwest Open champion, while Andrew Hood won the very first Closed in that same year. For those interested in learning more about the history of this event, and all the greats who played in it over the years, I have done a series on the tournament's history in my Nebraska Chess History group on Facebook.

So, we turn to the October 2-3, 1993 event which was held 30 years ago. The event was held in Omaha and was directed by yours truly. It drew a modest but strong crowd of 30 players. The event was won by NM Paul Rohwer, then still in high school at Brownell-Talbot with 4.5-.5. There was a 4-way tie for 2nd place between Michael Dreiger, Joe Kruml, Kent Nelson and Bruce Draney all with 4-1. Ten of the 30 players were rated Expert or higher and there were 2 Masters. In

addition there were four A players and another B player who jumped into Class A as a result in this event. In other words, 50% of the field was rated 1800 or above by the end of the tournament, a testimony to how prestigious this tournament still remained to players inside and outside of Nebraska.

OTHER CHESS EVENTS 10/1/2023-12/31/2023

There were plenty of smaller chess events held throughout the 4th Quarter of 2023. Here is a summary of many of them:

Spence Chess Club

October 2023-The Spence Club held a rated championship Swiss event that lasted from late September until late October. The winner was Nick Lacroix with a perfect 5-0 score. Alan Easey finished a strong second with 4-1. In all 18 players took part.

November 2023-On 11/1/2023 the club held a 6 round double Swiss 3/+2 blitz event that drew 12 players. Winner was Nick LaCroix with 10-2. Second was Abhinav Suresh with 9-3.

On 11/8/2023, the club held an G24/d5 3 round action Swiss that drew 11 players. Abinhav Suresh and Steven Cusumano tied for 1st with 2.5-.5.

On 11/15/2023, the club held a 4 round Quick Chess G/12 d3 event that drew 8 players and was won by Nick Lacroix with 4-0.

December 2023-On 12/20/2023, the Spence club held another G/3+2 blitz event that drew 11 players and was won by Nick Lacroix with 11.5-.5. Abhinav Suresh took 2nd.

Central Nebraska Chess Club of Kearney

The Central Nebraska Chess Club of Kearney hosted a tournament on 11/23/2023 that drew 12 players in the rated section. Thomas Jessop won the 3 round rated section with a score of 3-0. Tony Dutiel finished 2nd with 2.5-.5.
